The Learning Phase is where we collect all the knowledge we need to answer the main question. We learn from experts and from each other. We will share some important words and phrases and then we will build our knowledge by listening and questioning experts who will be asked how they would answer our main question. You will have plenty of time to ask your own questions of them.



You tell us what the public would make of it all!

After listening and learning you will share your ideas with us. Then you will come to London to meet each other in person and work together to create recommendations for the policy teams to consider.



What is a Citizens' Assembly?

This Assembly

The Assembly will explore the link between trade and climate change. The idea for this Assembly came from Queen Mary's University and the Trade Justice Movement. They noticed that policy makers didn't know how the public felt about using trade to address climate change, so they wanted to understand this to help shape policy in the future.

An <u>Advisory Board</u> was set up to make sure the process stayed fair and balanced. The Board helped to decide on the wording of the final question and how you should receive information. They will hear your findings and share them within their relevant policy networks.

The <u>Evidence Committee</u> dives deep into the details of what information you'll receive. They make sure you get the right information in an easy-to-understand and accurate way.




A citizens' assembly is when a bunch of regular people, randomly chosen, come together to talk about important stuff that affects their community or country. They discuss the issues, hear from experts, and then make suggestions or decisions. The idea is to give everyone a fair chance to have a say in how decisions are made.

The Advisory Board and the Evidence Committee set us some rules for sharing information with you. They said...



Personalise information to make it relatable for Assembly members

Make sure everyone knows exactly what information is being included and excluded



Make sure Assembly members can easily see the pros and cons of each option

How will your voice be heard?

1. Small groups

We'll have discussions in small groups with up to 8 people so that everyone can contribute.

2. Facilitated conversations

In each small group there will be a facilitator and a note taker to keep us to task and to capture our conversations.

You will see the notes from your group as they are written

3. Sharing and learning

What is discussed in small groups will also be shared with the wider group.

This way, we all learn from each other.

4. Working together

The core team will work closely with you to ensure you are comfortable and are able to ask questions as you learn.

MutualGain will take your thoughts and feedback and use it to ensure you enjoy your experience with us.

5. Continuous Learning

Sometimes, before or after a session, we might send you a short (2-10 min) film to watch, or a one pager to read or a short survey to complete.

This helps us to understand the variety of perspectives before or after discussion and debate.

So, just tell us if there is something that is not working for you.
